

KEEP AT HOME

- Fever higher than 100.4 degrees F (38 degrees C).
- Sore throat, with other symptoms such as a persistent cough.
- Vomiting or diarrhea in the past 24 hours.
- Eyes are pink and crusty.
- Has been exposed to an illness where isolation is recommended.

Racette Catholic Corner

When a Child Attends a Catholic School...

...they will experience faith in a Christ-centered school climate. Catholic schools attend to and nurture the faith of the young people entrusted to them within a total lived experience in the school community. We refer to this as permeation of the faith. The Gospel spirit is evident in all activities especially when school, home and parish community come together throughout the year to pray and celebrate. Jesus Christ is at the center of our faith.



Religious symbols and artwork enrich our school atmosphere in the classrooms

and hallways reminding us of the stories, people and truths of our faith

tradition. Because of our understanding that truth can be found in all branches of knowledge (science, history) we embrace the opportunity to invite God into all areas of our teaching.

Catholic Schools Are Faith Filled Learning Communities

Prayer supports what we do and how we do what we do. We begin and end our prayers with the sign of the cross as a reminder of who we pray to and are blessed by: God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We participate in prayer in a variety of ways:

- Prayer tables with the Word of God, the bible, visible in our classrooms
- School wide prayer
- Formal prayers such as the Our Father, Hail Mary, the Apostle's Creed and the Rosary.

We pray in time of joy and sorrow to support one another. We pray with body, mind, memory and imagination. We celebrate the mass and Liturgy of the Word. We look for God's grace in the ordinary, in each person, thing, place and event. Our conversations restore and build up the community and individuals in the community. We ask ourselves, "what would Jesus do in this situation" and teach our students to respond to each other and their community in a Christ-like manner.

Parish and School Relationships

Parishes are the basic unit of the Church with the parish priest as leader. The parish is the life-long faith community for a Catholic believer. Each of our schools is in a parish community that is a part of the Diocese of St. Paul. The bishop is the head shepherd of each diocese. Schools co-operate with

their parish in many ways including sacramental preparation, celebrations at the church and events during the various Church year seasons.

Our Catholic Schools - Learning Together, Growing Together

The Catholic teachings recognize the dignity and worth of all peoples, celebrating the diversity and uniqueness of individuals, cultures and faiths. We honour and respect that truths can be found in various religious traditions. Religious education classes teach the catechism of the Catholic Church based on four pillars understanding:


- Creed and Beliefs
- Sacraments and Liturgy
- Christian Morality
- Prayer

Students who are not Catholic or belong to another denomination or religion still learn about the sacraments in their religious education classes, however, respecting their own faith tradition, they are to receive their sacraments or religious rites and rituals in their own faith community. Everyone is accepted and included regardless of their religion.

Faith is the organizing principle for our Catholic school community. Students are expected to respectfully participate in religion classes to learn about Jesus and to understand the Catholic Church's tradition and teachings as well as religious celebrations and events in the school.







The end of November has a special solemnity (feast day) commonly known as "Christ the King," or more formally as "Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe." It marks the end of the liturgical year of the church as we begin to anticipate Christmas and the Advent season.

A Note From Mrs. Belland Now that we are in the swing of things for the new year, here are a few things

nat we are in the swing of things for the new year, here are a few thing we are working on.

1. Words Stick: As I mentioned last month, my focus in SST this year is on a "Words Stick" program. I have visited the **7-1's and 7-2's** several times in September and October to give them the opportunity to write positive comments (Sparkles) to each of their classmates. Each student in 7-1 and 7-2 should have received a key ring of Sparkles written from their classmates. We are hoping that through a demonstration of the power of negative comments, practice writing positive comments, and receiving positive comments, students will begin to say and post more positive things to each other. Some of the comments from the 7-1's and 7-2's about this project included "I learned that there is always something good about everyone" and "Nobody is perfect". I will be continuing this program throughout the year with other classes.

- 2. Heartmath: In October the Grade 9's have been learning about the Heartmath program in SST. This program teaches how to regulate emotions. We have talked about the different domains of health and how emotions can renew or drain our energy. We will also be learning a couple techniques that can help students to access their inner sense of ease and to make decisions.
- 3. Friendship: Throughout the year I will be talking about conflict resolution skills with each grade. In November I am planning to talk to the Grade 6's in SST about how to cope with Changes in Friendship.
- 4. Noon Games: On days when I am at Racette, I also run a Noon Game as a fun opportunity for kids to socialize with others at lunch. Generally, we do Movement Games on Mondays, "icebreaker" style games on Tuesdays, Word Games on Wednesdays, Improv Games on Thursdays, and Traditional Board/Card games on Fridays.


